Be Water Wise: Stay Well Back From Creeks, Ponds and Lakes During Spring Break-up

Spring is quickly approaching and with its warmer weather also comes melting snow, rain and the break-up of ice along the streams, ponds and lakes in Durham Region. Central Lake Ontario Conservation would like to remind residents of the dangers that exist on and near our creeks, ponds and lakes during spring thaw.

“During this time of year we can expect higher, faster flowing water within the creeks and thin ice on ponds and lakes. In addition, slippery and unstable stream banks along with extremely cold water temperatures can lead to very hazardous conditions close to any water body,” states Neil MacFarlane, Environmental Engineering Analyst at Central Lake Ontario Conservation. “We would like to remind people that as they enjoy the warm spring weather to stay well back from creeks, ponds and lakes and to please pass this message on to their children.”

The stormy weather forecast for the next couple of days, along with the approaching spring weather, reminds us that the potential for snow melt is increasing. The existing ice conditions from a cold February pose an increased concern for flooding and ice jams, especially if heavy rainfall occurs. Conservation staff will continue to monitor stream conditions and will issue messages when necessary. **If you notice an ice jam or potential flooding hazard please contact the Conservation office at (905) 579-0411.**

Please exercise caution around any water body over the next few weeks and help make this a safe and enjoyable spring.
