Looking for Chickadees



Keep your eyes peeled!

Black-capped Chickadees are about the same size as a navel orange. They are typically between 12–15 cm from beak to tail-tip.

Look for the "black cap" on their head.

Chickadee Chirping

Chickadees have many calls. Keep an ear out for these:

Chick-a-dee-dee

This is the one most people know. Chickadees use it to greet each other and alert others about food and danger. The more 'dee's, the more urgent the call.

Cheese-burger

This high, whistled song is used by males to attract mates, or by both sexes to communicate about movements and feeding the young.

Gargle Call

This rapid gargle is territorial and used to tell others who is in charge.

High 'Zee' Call

This call is used to warn others that there is a predator nearby.





Feathered Friends

From October to March, chickadees travel in flocks of up to 12 birds. During warmer months, they travel in breeding pairs.

Chickadees often form mixed-species flocks with other birds. When chickadees arrive, White-breasted Nuthatches usually follow soon after.
